## About this Episode

This episode of *iQ: smartparent* explores the so-called Summer Slide and what happens to kids' learning when the school year ends. The latest research shows that kids lose up to two months of learned material during an idle summer; this show examines the innovations, techniques, and activities that parents can use to emphasize continued learning and growth throughout the summer months.

### **Discussion Questions**

- 1. What are the things you notice most about your kids and learning in the summer? Do they like being in camps or organized programs? Talk about your own family's experiences with the summer slide. What kinds of activities have helped your kids keep learning and growing in the summer months?
- 2. School districts across the country have implemented a variety of programs to support their students in the summer months. Share with other parents the school-based programs in your community. What kinds of programs do you think would bring the greatest benefit to students, especially at-risk kids?
- 3. This episode features the work that libraries are doing to promote summer learning opportunities in their communities. How do you use your library for learning in the summer? What area libraries have you found offer the programming you need?
- 4. Lots of websites claim to offer great learning opportunities for kids. Talk about your family's rules for screen time and internet use. How do you decide if a website has educational value? How can you talk to your kids about determining whether a website is good for learning? How can you teach your child to recognize positive and negative images, behaviors, and interactions online?
- 5. What kinds of apps, games, or other technology have your kids used for learning over the summer? What are some of your concerns about using technology for learning?
