About this Episode

This episode of *iQ: smartparent* discusses media stereotypes that girls face, how girls consume media, how they make media -- and how girls and their parents can take control of the narrative about what's possible in life and in careers for girls. As well as learning how to find media that is empowering and builds self-esteem.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Do you think boys and girls have different social media rules? If yes, what are they and why is that the case?
- 2. What are some ways you can encourage girls to pursue their interests without worrying over gender expectations or peers' perceptions?
- 3. Who are the female celebrities your daughter follows? What do those individuals represent? Are they positive role models?
- 4. At what age are you talking to your children about stereotypes and media messages? How does the conversation change as your children get older?
- 5. How can we use digital media to *empower* girls and counter negative media messages? Do you discuss realistic versus unrealistic advertisements in the media with your children?
- 6. When working with girls you get to hear their authentic voices: Share an example of when you saw a young girl contribute her own strong voice to the media and what her message was.
- 7. Some of the negative media messages are subtle. Where do you think girls are most likely to see those subtle media messages that reinforce stereotypes of women as weak, or that focus on beauty over brains?
- 8. How do you talk to boys about media's messages about girls? Are they critical media consumers? Do they have realistic expectations of girls?
