In the face of righting the wrongs of slavery, defining reparations becomes highly contentious, with proposals facing criticism from both opposition and like-minded proponents. For the 'Just Futures' initiative, this difficulty is seen as an opportunity. As a community-driven, place-based project, reparations are intended to take different forms..."
 - Press Release, December 2020: "Reparations refers to compensation, which may include a national apology, educational, housing, and healthcare programs, and financial redress from the U.S. government to Native Americans for genocide and African Americans for the detrimental effects of slavery and beyond."
